#### INFORMATIONAL TEXTS

#### **NOBEL PEACE PRIZE**

This December is the 120th anniversary of the Nobel Peace Prize. What a great social studies lesson!

Teaching kids about finding ways to promote peace is such an important topic. There is also an interesting reason why the prize was created. Alfred Nobel was the inventor of dynamite which caused so much destruction. He wanted to help change the destruction that his invention caused by promoting peace. Later in the newsletter is a literacy activity based on a picture book about Alfred Nobel.



#### **BILL OF RIGHTS**

December is the 230th anniversary of the Bill of Rights. It is a great opportunity to talk about these important rights and how they impact us. Teaching about the Bill of Rights is an important civics lesson. Later in the newsletter you will find a literacy lesson activity that is tied to a picture book about the First Amendment.

## INFORMATIONAL TEXTS

#### 1st Grade: North Pole

Standard 3 of the Utah Social Studies Core talks about geographic tools and being able to identify the North Pole. Christmas time is also a fun time to learn about the North Pole. This reading is a Lexile of 230.

#### 2nd Grade: Bill of Rights

Standard 2 of the Utah Social Studies Core talks about the benefits of being an American Citizen. The Bill of Rights provide us so many freedoms which are a huge benefit. This reading is 430 Lexile. It can be a great way to celebrate the 230th anniversary of the Bill of Rights

#### **Bill of Rights**

#### 4th Grade: The Utah War

Standard 2 of the Utah Social Studies Core talks about how Utah has changed over time. The Utah War was a significant event and it played an important role in the development of Utah. This reading is 820 Lexile.

#### **The Utah War**

#### 3rd Grade: Hanukkah

Standard 2 of the Utah Social Studies Core talks about the role that cultures play in the community. This reading is 610 Lexile.
Students can learn about why and how this holiday is celebrated and learn that not every child celebrates Christmas.

## 5th Grade: Rights of the Accused

Standard 3 of the Utah Social Studies Core talks about the Constitution and the Bill of Rights. This reading helps students to better understand the 6th Amendment. This reading is 870 Lexile.

#### **6th Grade: Magna Carta**

Standard 2 of the Utah Social Studies Core talks about how the government of the Middle Ages and the Renaissance impacted modern times. The Magna Carta was an important document in England that our Bill of Rights was patterned after. This reading is 890 Lexile.

## LITERACY LESSONS

#### **Freedom for You and Me**

This lesson activity is appropriate for grades K-3. This lesson will have students reading, writing, and speaking and listening. Students will have a chance to talk to other students and share why certain freedoms are important to them. It is a great way to get students to start using civil dialogue at a young age.

#### 1-2-3 Special Speaking and Listening Activity

#### **Voices of Pearl Harbor**

This lesson activity is appropriate for grades 4-6. This story teaches about the attack on Pearl Harbor from many perspectives. It can be done like a Gallery Walk, Blended Learning Centers, or as a whole class. Students will complete a graphic organizer and compare accounts of the attack.

#### **Multiple Perspectives Activity**

#### **Alfred Nobel: The Man Behind the Peace Prize**

This lesson activity is appropriate for any of the grades. Students will have to evaluate the main idea of the book and then they will have a chance to share their ideas in a speaking activity. There is also a writing prompt to get students creating an opinion text
